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It was 1946 and there was a great need for skilled workers in Spain. Mr. José Antonio Elola Olaso, who was General Director of OJE (Spanish Youth Organization), had an insight. He felt that it was necessary to convince youth, as well as their parents, teachers and prospective employers, that their future depended on an effective vocational training system.

Later, Mr Olaso chose Francisco Albert-Vidal to further develop this idea together with Antonio Almagro Diaz and Faustino Ramos Diaz, who were on different occasion directors of the Work Centres. Dr Diómedes Palencia Albert, Director at that time of "Virgen de la Paloma" (the most important Spanish Training Centre), was appointed as technical adviser for the whole project. For this challenge the most suitable solution was to promote a competition. So, young people's competing spirit would be inspired, adults would discuss the competition results and visitors would be able to see a great variety of trades being demonstrated.

This simple yet brilliant idea of watching people from different trades at their workstations proved to be a great success. So, in 1947, with the participation of around 4,000 apprentices from a dozen mechanical trades, the first National Competition took place in Spain.

The digital era came along with the 21st century and the Board recognized the need to make the whole organization much more focused on marketing and promotion through programs like "WorldSkills Champions on the World Stage". Greater promotion and awareness brought a significant increase in Membership which greatly extended the global/geographic reach of WorldSkills. Through strategic efforts and targeted strategies, international media began to take notice of the organization with just under 1,000 media accredited to cover the 41st WorldSkills Competition in London, United Kingdom in 2011. Today, WorldSkills is held every two years in different parts of the world. It describes itself as the global hub for skills bringing together young people, industry, government, education, and institutions, to promote the benefits of and need for skilled trade professionals. The aims of the competition include demonstrating the advantages of learning a vocational skill, and encouraging 'parity of esteem' between vocational and academic qualifications.

The next WorldSkills Competition will be held in Shanghai, China from October 12th, 2022 to October 17th, 2022.

Currently it has 83 Member countries and regions, most of which organize national skills competitions that help to prepare the workforce and talent of today for the jobs of the future. WorldSkills India is an initiative of the National Skill Development Corporation (NSDC) under the Ministry of Skill Development and Entrepreneurship, Government of India. NSDC, through its WorldSkills India initiative, has been leading the country's participation at WorldSkills International competitions since 2011. This competitions help promulgate skills in society especially among the youth to motivate them to pursue vocational education which will be beneficial for them in the future and also help in inculcating various skills. It also create partnership network among various bodies and agencies such as government, industry, academic partners, VET institutions, trade associations and youth to promote skills and training. The competition helps in establishing long-term association with WorldSkills, International and other WorldSkills member countriessome of which include Argentina, Australia, Bangladesh, Brazil, Canada, China, France, Germany, India, Iran, Ireland, Mexico, New Zealand, Norway, United Kingdom, United Arab Emirates among many others.

It is a platform where emerging professionals can display their workplace skills with utmost perfection and make India proud. The competition also facilitates cooperation between government, industry and academia to create nationwide awareness, ownership and participation across various skills. WorldSkills mainly help Indian youth to attain world class standards of competence, excellence and productivity.

International Expert, WorldSkills, 2017 Out of the 51 skills represented in the competition, India is taking part in more than 45 skills such as Automobile Technology, Beauty Therapy, Cooking, Fashion Technology, Web Design, IT Software Solution for Business, Carpentry, Graphic Design Technology, Hair Dressing, Health and Social Care, Jewellery, Painting and Decorating, 3D Game Art, Industrial Control, Concrete Construction Work, Landscape Gardening, Print Media Technology and so on.

For a person to compete in Worldskills, they have to follow some procedures and get through various stages of competitions. Any skilled person who is 21 years and below can participate in any of the skills, with the exception to Aircraft Maintenance, Manufacturing Team Challenge and Mechatronics. For a person to take part in the competition, interested candidate should register in the portal dedicated to IndiaSkills Competitions.

The process of selecting the candidate is based on levels which starts from district and then move forward to state competition to regional and finally the national championship from where 2 best candidates would be selected and trained and put through tough challenges n tasks to check their skills,commitments & consistency and the one who wins the final selection competition would be representing India at WorldSkills, 2019 in Kazan, Russia.

NSDC took charge of worldSkills from 2011. Till last year the procedure for selecting the candidate was different and short but This year NSDC & the ministry came up with the idea of involving each state and union territory along with the Sector Skills Council who have always been a part of worldSkills from its initiation in India to play an important part in the selection of the candidate . This initiative was great step towards making people aware about the WorldSkills at rural and urban level.

Sector skill council plays the important role in the selection . A SSC being the pioneer on that particular skill provides the requisite infrastructure,training & experts to the candidate . SSC industry partner play a major role in backing up the skill with international expertise & updated infrastructure. The guidance plays a major factor in this competition.


IndiaSkills Competition is organised by National Skill Development Corporation (NSDC), working under the aegis of the Ministry of Skill Development and Entrepreneurship (MSDE). NSDC has been leading India's participation at the WorldSkills International competitions since 2011 along with sector skills councils. In the last edition of WorldSkills International 2019 held in Kazan, Russia, India won one gold and silver medals each, two bronze medals and 15 Medallions of Excellence, ranking 13 among 83 countries that participated in the global event for skill appreciation.

INDIASKILLS COMPETITION 2021

he long journey of IndiaSkills 2021, has been full of ups and downs due to the uncertain situations of COVID 19 in India. Despite that IndiaSkills 2021 was completed at ITPO, New Delhi from Jan 6th, 2022 – Jan 10th, 2022. Thousands of candidates registered for the India's biggest Skill Competition in 2019 & 2020 for 46 skills, 10 traditional skills and 4 demo skills. The competitors are all set to compete at the biggest showcase of skilled youth in India and further represent the country during WorldSkills, 2022.

REGIONAL COMPETITIONS

Four regional competitions-East, West, North and South-were conducted in Patna, Gandhinagar, Chandigarh, and Visakhapatnam, respectively, during October-December. More than 500 winners of all regional competitions combined will enter IndiaSkills Nationals. With an aim to provide world-class infrastructure to participants, the regional skill competitions were held in a decentralised model and were conducted at multiple Partner Institutes (Pis), specialising in different skills, in the host city. The opening and closing ceremonies took place at a centralised venue, where participants, jury, experts, mentors representing all skills were present.



It's a matter of pride for a state to have the winner. To prepare the candidates, all the states trained their registered and shortlisted candidates by the bootcamps organized by the state with support of Media & Entertainment Sector Skills Council. The candidates went through series of tests to reach the state level competition and the highest level of state competition happened with the support of AWSITCs, Experts and Sector Skill Councils. The grooming sessions were organized at every state and the top 2 candidates of the state reached the Regional Competition.

After the tough competition on various modules in each skill for 2 days; the region found the winners to compete and get glory for the state at IndiaSkills National Competition 2021. LIST of National CANDIDATES (or a page full of their collage.



Champions of WorldSkills Kazan Russia 2019

My journey with Worldskills started more than a year ago. Back then, this was just something I thought I should try my hand at. Never had I imagined, that I would leave everything just to train for the competition and be worthy of the jersey given to me with 'India' written on it.

It is a feeling like no other - to be selected, to represent a country of 1.4 billion for your skill, to proudly carry the Indian flag on your shoulders while receiving a medal, it's pretty surreal!

While going through the various selection rounds - from college, the regionals, nationals; with each passing round, I started taking the competition more seriously. I had no idea about the scale or the importance of the global platform that WorldSkills was providing until the Nationals.

I was really lucky to be selected in the top two chosen candidates after the national round. It was after this that I really picked up pace and gave my everything to the training and mentoring sessions.

We were training under the WorldSkills India appointed coach and expert Mr. Sathish Narayanan, our classes would go on for 8-10 hours each day, 6 days a week. But that was not all, to be able to perform at our peak at the final WorldSkills competition, we needed to be physically and mentally fit as well. I was exercising daily, attending yoga sessions, monitoring and regulating my diet so that I'll be comfortable in the foreign environment in Russia later. This really helped me later during the actual competition because a lot of other competitors were thrown off by the climate change and had fallen ill during the four days of our test modules. The arena in which our workstations are set up is humongous, because it houses more than 50 different skills and it stretched over an expanse of 74.8 hectares. To even visit the nearest washroom and back is quite a walk. And on top of that, the modules are really intense and the 6 hours of the competition are really crucial and tiring. So it was really important to be fit and have high levels of energy throughout the 4 days of the competition.

As for the test projects related to Graphic Design, it's not just about how creative you are but about how well you can use the limited time and resources, work with strict restrictions and still come up with innovative ideas for the brief given to you. It's also about your knowledge of softwares and industry specific technicalities.

THE FIRST INDIAN WOMAN TO WIN BRONZE MEDAL AT WORLDSKILLS (2019)

While my 4 years of education at the National Institute of Design helped me think creatively and stand out with my ideas, the training provided for WorldSkills helped me use my creative strengths, understand my weaknesses, and strategically work on how to score the maximum marks at the competition. Candidates from countries like China, France, Russia, etc had been training exclusively for WorldSkills for more than 4 years. Thus, personally, I would say it's really important that a candidate comes from a design background, because one year of training is a really short time to learn about Graphic Design as well as channelize those learnings to perform at WorldSkills.

Lastly, I'm really happy that I learnt so much over the last year, met amazingly talented people, got to visit and explore the cultures of different countries, found friends that I can call family and made some of the best memories of my life!

My journey started when I was doing my second year of college and my mother called me one day to tell me about the IndiaSkills ad she saw in the newspaper and wanted me to go home to Kerala to participate for the 3D Game Art competition. In Kazan, while I was at my workstation working on modules, I faced a lot of challenges that I couldn't even anticipate. But I was lucky enough to work my way through them and develop a product that won me a Medallion for Excellence.

It was like a test of Endurance, because i had times where i felt everything was falling apart and wanted to quit. But then i remember i have to fight on no matter what, at any cost. That attitude got me into thinking positive and i was able to finish everything on time in a way I wanted.

My message for upcoming competitors is that while you are at there, you have to have control over your mind and body and you must be able to visualize the goal. There will be pressure and challenges that might bring you to your knees, but the strongest thing you could do there is to get back up and fight your way through it.

Q. What is the most significant change that you notice from the time world skills was introduced in India till now?

A. At the time of India's first participation in Worldskills 2011, it was quite visible that our competitors were not fully prepared to exhibit their skills required at a Worldskills level. However, with passing times our participants have polished and honed their skills. as They have not only developed the required competitive enthusiasm and passion but have also made involvement in Worlskills competition aspirational. In the last 5 years our youth's passion in WorldSkills competition has multiplied manifolds adding to our medal tally.

Q. What should be done to improve and multiply skills among the young people of the nation?

A. With the ever-changing industrial scenario, there is a consistent demand of skilled work force in India and abroad. Future skills are over shadowing traditional skills. Modern computer and tech savvy industrialization is craving for multiskilled task force to systematically reduce human interface in production lines. Govt funded programs and industrial outreach is paving way to improve and multiply skills in present youth. Vocational training at school/college level is another alternate way.

Q. As per NEP, skilling can be added from school level. Do you think if younger candidates can be mobilized for WorldSkills Competitions?

A. A proactive step has already been initiated in terms of Junior skills competition in 21 skill sets. National competitions are being held alongside Indiaskills to encourage and recognize our junior skill ambassadors.

Q. Do you think there are chances of getting more medals to the country when the candidates are getting trained for WorldSkills competitions at Authorized WorldSkills India Training centers for 2 years or in specialized courses for these competitions?

A. Under the worldskills training programs, there are no distinct Authorized WorldSkills India Training centers. Infact no such promotion has yet been authorized by NSDC. Worldskill training is facilitated through industry/Institution in partnership with NSDC through Sector Skill Councils. These partners give specific training to the shortlisted competitors on equipments which are recommended by Worldskills forum. In addition, the State govts run similar programs to prepare their State's team participation in Indiaskills competition. This approach has a proven track record and the performance of the participants has significantly improved.

Q. Where do you see India skills in upcoming WorldSkills Competition in Shanghai during the month of October 2022?

A. Under the Covid challenges, we would endeavor to position ourselves in first 10 teams at the Worldskills 2022 Shanghai.

Q. During WS Kazan, 3D Digital game art was a new skill and MESC bagged a Medallion of Excellence. This time India is participating in Industrial Design Technology. What prospects did you see in selecting these trades?

A. It is quite early to comment on the positioning of any skill in Worldskills Shanghai at this moment. Perhaps, the training and development of the participants followed by a 3-level test to judge the level of preparedness will give some indication of it's future prospects in Worldskills competition.

Q. Do you think technical knowledge is more important that the creativity? Why?

A. I disagree. It is a balanced approach between the two which would be helpful in getting expected results.

Q. Any message you would like to convey to the participants of India skills and future aspirants for WorldSkillsCompetitions?

A. Success lies in participant's determination and commitment for intense training of their skill and thorough hands-on practice. Indian youth is no less than any foreign youth. They have everything to be future winners.

Q. You have been associated with WorldSkills since inception what is the major change you noticed between the competition then and now, especially after Covid.

A. There has been distinct changes since we took the membership in the year 2007. It has become more competitive with 85 member countries, possibly because across the globe people have realized the value of skills. Yes, there has been learning after each competition and India Skills Contingent has shown good progression since good practices and the knowledge gained were incorporated. The Industry, Corporates and the Government too realised the value of personnel trained on WorldSkills accredited standards specifications. The competitions have also become more automated, with inclusion of skills such as Artificial Intelligence, Cloud Computing, Cyber Security and so forth. The Competitions are also getting bigger and better.

Yes, after Covid and in present situation hybrid mode of training is generally adopted which cannot match with the physical training adopted in safer times which does reflect on the performance at the Competitions.

Q. What should be done for WorldSkills to attract more young aspirants to participate in the competition?

A. You see, it is essential to create awareness of the various skills which can benefit the in the year 2007industry and create job opportunities which increase the economy of the country. Also, the people participating in this type of competitions should be acknowledged at all levels and felicitated by dignitaries, making them heroes. The States could consider providing assured jobs and promotions which will be a great incentive for young aspirants to participate.



Q. Do you feel that the Indian competitors are lacking behind in the technical field as compared to the international competitors?

A. I don't think we are lacking behind by any means, there is no doubt about it. All over the world we find Indians working in various fields, outperforming their counterparts. The Skills is in our DNA, it is just the opportunities should be provided by provisioning proper resources in terms of Infrastructure and updated tools, with of course good trainers for training the aspirants. We should consider aligning our curriculum with the accredited World Skills Standard Specification to benchmark the skills Internationally.

Q.Do you recommend training at ASSITC for better results for WorldSkills Competitions and why?

A. Yes definitely, since AWSITC are accredited training Centre where training on Skill Specific WorldSkills Standard Specification is designed for Competitors on WorldSkills guidelines by domain Experts. The centre is equally equipped with the desired resources including Infrastructure tools and equipment. Past performance of AWSITC trained candidates speaks volume of the same.

Q. This year 35% of National Competitors are from AWSITC. How do you find AWSITC growing in coming years?

A. Relatively seeing the performance of competitors trained at AWSITC Centre and those who could not avail the facility, a distinct difference is observed in performance. Till now this initiative has only been taken by Media and Entertainment Sector Skill Council and as a pilot project has shown excellent results hence much more such Centres could be developed. With the introduction of Skill training in schools under the NEP it is essential such centres must come up in States, aligned with the industry job requirements. Such a step will definitely improve the standard at the International Competitions also

Q. What do you think is the most important characteristic that a skills professional possess to win at the International Competition or to be successful.

A. The most important characteristic a competitor must possess is that he must have a winning attitude with a desire to learn and grow. Besides must be mentally and physical fit with the wish to remain updated with the growing technology.

Q. Any advice you would like to give to the Competitors and future aspirants.

A. The competitors must have confidence in themselves and their Experts and follow their dreams, remain focussed while working will give you happiness and success in life.

Q. How important is art and creativity in the field of graphic design technology?

A. We should not see graphic design technology as a field of digital design; it's actually more than that and I prefer to focus primarily on communication design. Graphic design is a skill which helps us to build digital media which in turn assists us to communicate our idea, knowledge and thoughts to present it visually. We are in the era of high-tech information and human brain takes visual information faster. To conclude, communication or you can say graphic design is a medium to spread information clearer and faster in visual form.

Q. What has been your greatest achievement so far and why?

A. I believe my greatest achievement is not all about receiving any awards or rewards. Achievement is about being happy with what you do and if you are happy then you can achieve a lot from that. Thereafter I was invited to be a Jury at Indiaskills Regionals (East) at Patna from 20 - 23 Oct 2021 and then again at Indiaskills Regionals (West) at Ahmedabad from 30 Oct - 1 Nov 2021. I took up the responsibility to be able to interact with, guide and motivate the designers of the country. I came across many gaps in their training and approach and wanted to help them. I guided each on their further roadmap to Indiaskills (Nationals). Some of them were never exposed to measurement whereas others were trained in the same, thus creating a non-level playing field for them.

I ensured that they were given immediate clarifications even though it was not the norm at those competitions.

Q. Please tell us about your skill and what's the best career opportunity available in the same?

A. I have been involved with Graphic Design and related domains since 1996, when I started out Training Graphic Designers as a Business. Students mentored with me have been considered in the Top 10 UX Designers or the country and are also leading the way as Design Heads of top organizations across India and the world like at Yatra.com, Gaana.com and Sony Ericsson. They have also helped setup leading organizations like Net Solutions, Intelligaia, Idea Catalyst, and Aleph Labs, Singapore.A good Graphic Designer today can start at salary packages such as 3 - 6 LPA with good design studios in the web and UI space or with leading Ad Agencies.

Q. How do you prepare for the training and bootcamps before the IndiaSkills National competitions at AWSITC?

A. I talk to the industry and understand the current practices as well as revise myself by interacting with recent practitioners. I focus on providing good critique to the competitors since critique is core to improvement in the design industry.

Q. How do you motivate candidates during workshops and competitions?

A. During competition and otherwise too, I maintain a very approachable stance and ensure that the competitor never gets stressed by the environment. I am happy to say that no competitor felt stressed out during the 2 competitions that I was part of (Stress out did happen in certain other regional).

I also personally interviewed and interacted with all wild card entries and gave individual advice to them as well. I am also in touch with the candidates and keep providing motivation to those candidates.

Q. How do you envision AWSITC?

A. I see AWSITC as an important bridge between academics and industry. I believe that we must make AWSITC to be the go to plateau for all skill hirings in future. This is totally possible with the right vision in place.

Q. As 35% candidates that have reached IndiaSkills National competition 2021; what's your opinion and say for AWSITC concept?

A. Let us make it 100% in future with AWSITC becoming the industry standard for training. We would collaborate with all National Institutions to take it forward.

Q. What motivates you to be an expert to train a candidate for IndiaSkills?

A. Reaching the Indian talent at the world stage as well as providing Indians a rightful place in the world market motivates me to be a Jury and Expert at Indiaskills.

Q. Please share some memorable moments you've experienced at IndiaSkills.

A. I shared wonderful camaraderie with my co-Jury and prior Worldskills medal winner Shweta Ratanpura so much that our judgement scores were almost matching at most places. Our pick of the final winners at Patna was same, whereas other Jury had a different lineup. Finally I am happy that our pick was the final medal lineup a Patna.

Q. What's your aim for WorldSkills Shanghai 2022?

A. I am open to supporting Indiaskills to develop the talent as well as a jury panel. I have even nominated other jury for the same, as my core aim is to promote the Skill not myself.

Q. How do you see AWSITCs growing and preparing candidates for WorldSkills Lyon 2024?

A. I see AWSITCs take a more proactive role in future and train candidates much before Indiaskills. For this we would require a lot of Government will and support since schools or candidates may not be able to cover the investment required to set up good training. I am ready to take up at least 60-100 trainees and prepare them for the world stage.

Q. Your mantra or guidance to aspirants of WorldSkills and other international competitions?

A. Represent the Country not yourself. You get represented by us. Do your best and do not worry about the results. You are deserving if you have been selected to represent the country!



Simoul Alva

Winner – Mini Skills Russia & Medallion of Excellence - 2017 Graphic Design Technology

Simoul Alva is a Graphic Design intern currently at Pentagram, New York, under Michael Bierut. Her merit has previously been recognised by the Ratan Tata Foundation for standing first in her entire first year batch at the National Institute of Design, India. She was subsequently awarded as one of the 25 upcoming designers under the age of 25 by TATA Gen X Nano in India. Her work has been recognised by the Type Director's Club, Print Magazine, Luerzer's Archive and The One Club for Creativity.

She is also the South Asia Pacific recipient of the Helen LandsowneResor Scholarship by J. Walter Thompson and the 4A's Foundation for 2017. This award is conferred upon only five design/advertising female students from across the world. Simoul is also this year's recipient of the Patrick Kelly Scholarship by The One Show. 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3D Digital Game Art

The games development sector consist of three work roles: the Designer, the Artist, and the Programmer. The 3D Digital Game Artist takes a designer's brief and, through a combination of conceptualization, creativity, selectivity, technical, and specialist skills, completes the brief to the satisfaction of the client.

After interpreting the brief, the 3D Digital Game Artist must produce a 2D digital concept of the required assets for the game, which could include objects, characters, and environments. The skills required at this stage will be in developing good silhouettes so that designs can be recognized immediately without detail, to produce greyscale values that highlight the important details of an asset, to define a colour scheme based on their knowledge of colour balance, saturation, and mixing.

The 3D Digital Game Artist receives, conceptualizes, and interprets the design brief on the basis of their market knowledge and skill sets, and the given scope and limits of the brief. The skills required of the 3D Digital Game Artist can be broken down further into 2D concept art, texture painting, 3D modelling, rigging, and animating. This could be a process for one artist or a team that has specialized in each area of the pipeline process. An artist often works with a team of other artists led by an Art Lead or Art Director. In smaller companies, the artist will work closely with the programmer and designer. Depending on the size of the company, a large team of artists may work in an office and is likely to be open plan for creative involvement across the team. Sometimes an artist must work in isolation on strictly confidential assets in a game.

The sector has demonstrated tremendous growth in the last years and the skills and software changes constantly, however the core pipeline has remained relatively constant. The artist's role has evolved and split into various specialisms, yet all require an appreciation of aesthetics, colour, structure and form as well as movement. More recent developments in virtual and augmented realities have led to a strong need for artists who can produce assets that operate in these 3D environments. The best artists are able to lead art teams solving visual errors and producing assets that operate on the fringes of the available technology to achieve the most absorbing experiences possible in a videogame.

Q. What made you choose a career in the field of 3D games and animation?

A. As it always happens, one's passion for something makes you do things that you would not really have planned for. The same happened with me. My passion for playing games at that time and my background in programming brought me towards a super niche area like games and animation. Being a programmer at heart, at that time, my only ambition was to make my own games engine, which I did and once the engine was there, I looked towards how I can utilise that to do what I loved the most that is video games. Animation being an integral part of any video games, it was the natural next choice.

Q. What is your success mantra that helped Lakshya Digital become the pioneer in the gaming industry in India?

A. People. I have always believed that if we get the right team in place, who believe in the objectives that the organisation wants to achieve, success will happen. Work will happen. When I was playing games, I used to see the amount of work that goes into creating the visual elements in the game. That was the time when outsourcing had made big inroads in many industries. Everybody was trying to reduce costs. So, at that time I realised, game art being a manpower intensive domain, very soon it will become an issue for the gaming industry. With rising manpower costs in the west, the success of a game would ride on how cost effective the development was. So, that gave me a sense that this would be an area where we can play a big role, if we get the right team in place and I got lucky that I was able to rally a team of amazing leaders and artists who believed in the vision that I had about where we can go in this initiative. Though, in the gaming industry at that time, outsourcing was the word everybody hated.

Q. How do you think the gaming industry has developed over the years?

A. Gaming is a hot business and everyone acknowledges it now. The transformation of a nascent, hobbyist engagement that was frowned upon by parents and teachers alike has mushroomed into a \$105 billion USD globally and is the largest segment within the entertainment industry, far exceeding movies or music.

The definition of gaming has changed and so has the gaming industry which is now redefining entertainment. India is no exception and the Indian gaming industry is currently valued at over \$300 million or approximately Rs 2000 Crores. The phenomenon that gaming has now become can be attributed to a string of factors that revolutionised the industry and made it into what it is today. With a population of 1.3 billion people and two thirds of them under the age of 35, India has the world's largest youth population. The growth is driven by higher disposable incomes, introduction of new gaming genres and the increasing number of smartphone and tablet users following on the back of constantly improving connectivity across the country. With these distinct advantages, India is all set to become one of the world's leading markets for Gaming.

Q. What do you think are the challenges that designers face with constantly evolving technology in the industry?

A. The key challenge that designers and developers face today is to not only to keep abreast with developments and new trends in the industry, but also master new tools and technologies else their games will not look or play as well as other successful games. Technical aspects of game development are changing with lightning speed. With newer technologies and engines being introduced in the market every day, they themselves might find it difficult to be employed if they don't embrace the changes and evolve with the industry.

Q. How has your experience been with being associated with IndiaSkills?

A. So far, the experience has been exciting. As Industry partner, we have had the opportunity to design and execute each step of the process leading to World Skills 2019. The selection & evaluation process once again highlighted the availability of abundant talent in our country today. The free-of-cost Bootcamp that we organised in September gave exposure to participants from all corners of the country and we were thrilled to have been able to do that. On the administrative front, the association with India Skills is quite dynamic, (and we hope stability sets in by the end of this year) for but still we don't get a sense of a rollercoaster ride, yet. Looking at the skills and talent that we have around, not only in 3D Digital Game Art but, other categories too makes us hopeful of a win for India.

We did not feel any pressure and have confidence that as an Industry partner Lakshya will ensure that this category gets a fair opportunity. The passion to see India shine in 3D Digital Game Art is a huge enough motivator for us.

Q. What would be your message to the participants of IndiaSkills competition?

A. My message to them would be that never compare yourself to what is around you, you may be better than them. Always compare yourself to the best out there, globally. Are you as good as that? Only then you will drive yourself to be on the top, be the best that there is. Never settle for good enough. Aim to be the best. You should set the benchmark, not follow them.

Print Media Technology

The Print Media Technician is involved with all aspects of the printing process from the initial planning and preparation, through the print run, checking for consistent quality to cleaning up after the print run is complete. The work is usually large-scale production of printed materials for a range of clients. Specifically, Print Media Technology involves the production of printed material using an offset sheetfed press and other equipment to create finished, printed products for commercial and packaging industry. This occupation is responsible for producing all printed material at a printing operation. The Technician will usually work in printing businesses or publishers and will use complex specialist equipment. A detailed knowledge of the equipment and materials used is vital to produce high quality products that comply with the specification in a cost-effective and efficient manner. The Print Media Technician requires an in-depth knowledge of handling, troubleshooting, and maintaining printing factors such as ink, paper, and equipment. Generally, production of the printed product will use a traditional ink-on-paper process, but increasingly technicians are using digital printing technologies for occupation is responsible for producing all printed material at a printing all printed material at a printing operation.

The Technician will usually work in printing businesses or publishers and will use complex specialist equipment. A detailed knowledge of the equipment and materials used is vital to produce high quality products that comply with the specification in a cost-effective and efficient manner. The Print Media Technician requires an in-depth knowledge of handling, troubleshooting, and maintaining printing factors such as ink, paper, and equipment. Generally, production of the printed product will use a traditional ink-on-paper process, but increasingly technicians are using digital printing technologies for shorter runs and utilize variable data.

Print Media Technicians also have to be able to mix custom ink colours and operate cutting equipment to produce a job to a customer's specifications. Quality control equipment like densitometers and photo spectrometers are used to verify and adjust the print quality.

Q. When and why did you take the responsibility to become a IndiaSkills Expert?

A. Since, I have been grooming candidates for India Government initiated National Level competitions even way back in 2018 with the first Smart India Hackathon, I was happy when MESC invited me to join a Worldskill Experts Training camp in April 2021 and then again in June 2021. Later I was invited by Future Skills to be a Jury at Asiaskills friendly games, and then Indiaskills Regionals (South) [North I had opted out as it was my region]. Later, I also was Jury at Autodesk Futureskills Competition on 9-10 Dec 2021. I also was a part of the Future Skills/ World Skills initiate to groom candidates Internationally from 27 Nov 2021 to 19 Dec 2021 alongside Experts from Worldskills, Russia and Worldskills, Croatia. I have been mentoring 1000s of students across India through Shiksha.com (Where I was their first Chief Mentor) and Quora.com (where Millions of students across the world were reaching out to read my guidance and answers to their queries. I am habitual guide, mentor and motivator, and have never declined an opportunity to raise the next generation. I am already a regular jury at Serious Play Awards, at University of Central Florida, USA, besides jurying at Wharton QS, Smart India Hackathon 1.0 and many others. I have mentored many students to be entrepreneurs and leaders in their domains of interest. Many are today considered leading experts in the world or the country in their domains.

Q. Please tell us about your skill and what's the best career opportunity available in the same?

A. My skill at Worldskills is Industrial Design Technology, and my Bachelors in Mechanical Engineering (1988) where I was exceptional in Engineering Drawing and Machine Drawing gives me an advantage that modern Industrial Design people trained with less depth in Engineering may not possess. Later my MBA (1990) and subsequent jobs in Engineering as well as management gave me the dual advantage of being able to understand the market as well as customer behavior, alongwith the financial implications and market feasibility of the products that are design. My qualifications combine a 7 year of learning all aspects of engineering, design and business backed by 31 years of experience in various aspects of design including 6 years as Dean at Chitkara University. There are a lot of opportunities available for Product Designers especially if they are aware of the modern versions which include digital as well as IOT based products. The current figures indicate that between 80-90% of all IIT/ IIIT graduates land up into UX Design, which is again my forte. These careers are fetching easily between 6-12LPA for the right freshers on an average. Even those from lesser qualifications start from 3 LPA.

Q. How do you prepare for the training and bootcamps before the IndiaSkills National competitions at AWSITC?

A. I gave seminars on Design Thinking to the entire set of applicants before the Indiaskills Regionals. It had tremendous

response with some winner coming back to me about how they were benefited by the Seminar. I organised for Future Skills/ Worldskills, a 50 hours FREE International Workshop for all 10 selected Indiaskills candidates alongwith Experts from Worldskills, Russia and Worldskills, Croatia. During the competition, I involved and motivated all other Jury. I fully involved other Jury in development of the Test Project, thus bring a new approach at par with the Worldskills approach, in comparison to the earlier approaches.

Q. How do you motivate candidates during workshops and competitions?

A. I personally meet them and discuss very relevant and contemporary ideas with them, like I recently discussed about a bad product design for a PET bottle that was given to them for mineral water during Indiaskill Regionals (South). I also lend a keen ear for any problems they face or any questions they may have during the competition. Even during Asiaskills in July 2021, I reviewed the projects on their viability and later during the Future Skills Competition too. I also personally involved and motivated all other Jury and helped them out in case of difficulty with immediate problem solutions and the jury was finished in record time. During workshops, I create relevant problem statements where they are able to look at product design in a more sustainable way. I also offer them multiple ways to look at problems that the singular approaches that are often taught at leading institutes. I have always been keen to learn from my peers across the world (and always acknowledge their contributions to my knowledge). During the Future Skills Training I was able to train the candidates on advanced topics as well as approaches to Design and the same was appreciated heavily by the SCM (Skill Competition Manager).



Q. How do you envision AWSITC?

A. AWSITC is a great initiative to serve the interests of developing the Skillset of Indian Candidates and even beyond, since the larger goal is to understand the standards of Worldskills and then offer training as per Worldskill Standards to the masses. I believe AWSITC has not seen even a small portion of the potential it holds and am keen to develop this concept if an opportunity is given to me to do so.

Q. What motivates you to be an expert to train a candidate for IndiaSkills?

A. I have been grooming candidates for India Government initiated National Level competitions even way back in 2018 with the first Smart India Hackathon when I groomed and mentored candidates in Robotics. The candidates mentored by me finished 1st in India and another set groomed by me finished 3rd . This was the best podium finish across all SIH categories. As a Jury I get the opportunity to be a role model through my personal approach to problems, and I believe that it is the best way to groom a future designer.

Q. Please share some memorable moments you've experienced at IndiaSkills.

A. I could motivate all the Jury to collaborate with me, to design the test project, as well as conduct the jury seamlessly, to deliver the fastest compilation of results by 6:00pm to MESC Team (within 90 minutes of the ending of competition). I took on all the tough parts like compiling information in the required formats, as well as tweaking the assessment to suit the given project. All this happened without any incident. Being appreciated by all co-Jury was the most memorable moment of Indiaskills for me. It was collaboration at first sight for me with each individual Jury member and there was not a moment of distrust between us, which was a totally different experience for the Jury in comparison to the previously held event. I must mention here, that Training other Jury had not been a norm at Indiaskills, which I tried my best to correct. I kept a very approachable space, as well as proactively told everything required instead of embarrassing the jury into having to ask me every time.

Q. What's your aim for WorldSkills Shanghai 2022?

A. If given an opportunity I would be aiming for a huge Indian footprint on Worldskills Shanghai, both in terms of Indian Talent as well as Jury. Indian Talent should be envied for it's approach which is not only visible through it's scores but also through it's methodology. Indian Jury must be taken more seriously – and I have taken the first step towards that by collaborating on the Future Skills platform of Worldskills, and consider it a great and prestigious breakthrough to be recently personally being offered to be the Chief Expert at Worldskills Shanghai by Mr. Andrey Ermakov, the Skill Competition Manager, Industrial Design Technology. I hope it materializes since it would be India's Entry into Worldskills as a Chief Expert – a step towards recognition of Indian Expertize.

Q. How do you see AWSITCs growing and preparing candidates for WorldSkills Lyon 2024?

A. We need people who can play a lead role in capacity building, especially in Skills Competition Management, Test Project Development, Assessment Methodology, Competition Information Systems, Workshop Setup and Management, Health and Safety, Skill Development and Promotion, and Skills Training and Curriculum Mentorship. This is not possible till we have a core group which is collaborative and committed. We may also need a few full time people for each skill that we need to grow.



Q. Your mantra or guidance to aspirants of WorldSkills and other international competitions?

A. Be fair and ethical in your approach. You are representing a nation. India doesn't cheat! And the world must know that! It would bring a lot of work to India. So be the role model for Industrial Design Community of India.

Q. As 35% candidates that have reached IndiaSkills National competition 2021; what's your opinion and say for AWSITC concept?

A. AWSITC has had a good start, and the enormous number of candidates that are successful at Indiaskills is a pointer to that. This concept needs to be grown further, and a sustainable model for AWSITC is required. I would be happy to develop this concept if an opportunity is given to me to do so.

Q. How has been your IndiaSkills 2021 journey so far?


